Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

At Bridge, we are committed to ensuring that every pupil in every class achieves to the best of their ability. We believe that every child can succeed and expect all of our staff to have the highest expectations and aspirations for our pupils.

We intend to use our Pupil Premium funding to ensure disadvantaged pupils are well supported to achieve in line with national expectations. Our group of disadvantaged children is much broader than those in receipt of Pupil Premium funding. Our key strategies aim to support all children – particularly in their development of language and reading skills.

We aim to do this by:

- Using evidence-based research to implement effective teaching and learning strategies and interventions.
- Developing robust oracy and vocabulary development across the curriculum to promote understanding and independence.
- Ensure that well-structured and sequenced reading supports is in place for all learners.
- Providing children with valuable learning experiences and access to enrichment activities.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	English as an Additional Language 84% of children at Bridge Junior School have English as an Additional Language. For the majority, English is not spoken at home with parents and additional support is required to engage parents. Significant work is required in school to support language acquisition and fill vocabulary gaps.
2	Mobility In-year admissions are high throughout the academic year. The vast majority of children who are admitted to our school are from abroad and have very limited English. This has been a growing trend over the last

	few academic years. By Year 6, over 20% of pupils did not join the school in Year 3.
3	Phonics A significant number of disadvantaged children are not phonologically secure. This has an impact on Reading attainment as well as access to the broader curriculum.
4	SEND Around 20% of our disadvantaged pupils also have special educational needs.

<i>Appointment of Family Support Worker</i>	0.5 day/week Family Support Worker is employed to support parents with support for access to services and positive parenting approaches.	1,2

Our KS2 Outcomes for 2024/25 demonstrate good progress and attainment for disadvantaged children at our school.

65/90 children in our cohort had KS1 data to use as a baseline for progress across KS2. The progress scores for the cohort demonstrate good progress being made by disadvantaged pupils.

Internal data gathered from teacher assessments and standardised end of year tests show that disadvantaged children attain at a similar standard to their peers. There is a more significant gap in maths which is being addressed as a whole school strategy through work with our regional Maths Hub.
